In this fierce and unflinching fantasy, sixteen-year-old Deka lives in Otera, a deeply patriarchal ancient kingdom, where a woman's worth is tied to her purity, and she must bleed to prove it. But when Deka bleeds gold – the colour of impurity, of a demon – she faces a consequence worse

than death. She is saved by a mysterious woman who tells Deka of her true nature: she is an Alaki, a near-immortal with exceptional gifts. The stranger offers her a choice: fight for the Emperor with others just like her, or be destroyed.

Set in a West African-inspired world, girls are outcasts by blood and warriors by choice. This book is perfect for fans of Children of Blood and Bone and Black Panther. Forna creates a captivating world that completely absorbs the reader, leaving them inspired, ambitious and in awe.

Second place: Lead Dudley and Jess Hubbard (minion cake)


Third place: Alfie Hall, Ebi Khan, Teddy Robbins and Vlad Lovha (star canopy cake)

# Creating a book with Tamsin Rosewell

As part of enrichment week, our students in Year 7 and Year 8 explored the process of creating a book.

They began their day with a Zoom meeting with local illustrator and bookseller, Tamsin Rosewell (Kenilworth Books), who shared her experiences of the publishing world, working with writers and illustrating her own book.

Students were shown original artwork from James Dixon's latest story, *The Billow Maiden*, which Tamsin was the illustrator for, as well as the rough work which led to the final piece.



Tamsin talked to our students about the various roles involved in bringing a book to life and how an illustration is informed by the

narrative and intended audience.

Tamsin used the finished painting that she created for the front cover of 'The Billow Maiden' to inspire students in their own writing and enthuse them about the joy of illustrating and writing.

Afterwards, students broke out into smaller groups to generate ideas for their own book. They were given a menu of tasks to choose from: appetizers such as mood boards and character profiles, main courses included a blurb or opening page and finally, desserts, in which students created accompanying playlists and snacks for their books.

The session culminated in a spectacular showcase of their original ideas and book tokens were awarded to students for the best work to spend in our pop-up book shop.



#### A visit from Mindu Hornick



On 14th July, Year 8 and GCSE students had the privilege to welcome Mindu Hornick, an Auschwitz and Holocaust survivor, to Henley in Arden School. This was the final part of their learning about the Holocaust.

Mindu at the age of just 13, was sent to Auschwitz-Birkenau with her mother, sister, and two younger brothers.

On their arrival, a Polish prisoner bravely told the girls to lie about their age and to say that they were seamstresses. Taking this advice, Mindu and her sister were separated from their family and sent on ahead, initially to sort prisoners' confiscated clothing, they would never see their father, mother or brothers again.

Mindu shared her memories of the daily existence in Auschwitz, eating turnip soup, the stench of the camp, poor sanitation and the lack of any hope of escape. She told students of spotting the infamous Josef Mengele who would signal, with a wave of his white gloves, those who would die.

Mindu recalls the support of her Aunt also incarcerated in the same block as she and her sister.

After nine months they were transferred to Neondamar Concentration Camp, close to Hamburg, where they were to work in a munitions factory. Mindu recalls that if this hadn't happened she would not have survived Auschwitz.

After the liberation of the camp in 1945, Mindu and her sister returned to Prague, but it was not long before they had to leave their home country due to the Soviet occupation and the regime's hostility to Jews.

Mindu came to the UK to live with a family member in Birmingham.

It was an honour for Mindu to come and share her story with us. In the face of such hatred she shared with the students the importance of respect, and that respect should always be shown to everyone no matter their perceived differences.

Mindu was very warm and students remained in the hall to informally chat with her afterwards which she welcomed.

Students had the opportunity to write letters to Mindu which were posted out by Mrs Shipley. The letters were all very moving and below is an anonymous example of how moving the experience truly was for our students.

Dear Miss Hornick

14th July 2022

I would first like to thank you for re-living these horrific experiences to share your story with us. It is a very important thing to ensure that these terrible events never happen again. Your story was moving and touching and I really appreciate being able to hear it.

Your testimony has been enlightening for me and many other students and has shown us a deeper insight into the atrocities which made up the holocaust, and the fact that you have taken time and effort to come and speak to us after you have experienced these terrible events is truly brave and touching.

Your inspiring story has shown to us students the importance of hope, and how even in the most dire circumstances which you have been through, you seem to keep that attitude of hope and optimism, and that is truly extraordinary and inspiring. These experiences are the worst things anyone has and ever could fathom, but you telling your story and making it so it can live on is something that is unforgettable and priceless, and I am truly grateful for you telling it to us and many other people.

# A message from the Henley Senior Leadership Team...

**Dear Parents** 

It has been such a pleasure to see so many parents at the many celebrations for rewards, shows and parent meetings over this last half term. As we turn our attention towards the new academic year we continue to want this positivity to drive the energy for learning and high expectations we have for the young people in our community.

With this in mind I would ask you to ensure you have the Classcharts app on your phone so that you are able to support your child with their learning as well as to receive daily messages about their day. Classcharts will show you their timetable, homework, behaviour notifications and it also offers the opportunity to communicate your child's wellbeing.

In preparation for September, we would also like to communicate some changes to the behaviour system. D3s which are the sanction that generate a detention after school will now generate that detention on the consecutive day. For example, a D3 in Maths on a Tuesday will result in a detention on the Wednesday. In addition where a child does not attend a Head Teachers detention on a Friday they will be LOST (Loss of Social Time) for the next week. Whilst students receiving these sanctions are minimal, we do ask for your support in this regard. Sanctions offer an opportunity for patterns of behaviour to be prevented from becoming embedded and as such we hope them to have a positive impact on behaviour and progress.

Staff work hard to plan fun and progressive lessons where a focus on pace is vital to secure good opportunity for progress for all. Students who disrupt learning place their own progress at risk as well as that of their peers and this is not acceptable at Henley In Arden School.

We would also therefore remind you that a teacher's judgement should be respected and supported.

Finally, can we appeal for all uniform to be updated over the summer to cater for growth spurts such that trainers are not worn to school and that skirts are at the correct length.

We do want to focus on the Reward system we have in place and once again can we congratulate the 83% of students who have achieved their PRIDE award this year – a record for the school.

Please ensure they wear their colours with PRIDE as they enter the 2022-23 academic year which, with a bit of luck, may well be a year of normality.


It is an exciting chapter in all of your lives as you now venture on to pastures new, and I wish you all the success in your new setting.
